
Congrats, everyone! You overcame all of your obstacles and earned your diplomas









Wish You Well...

FENTANYL INFORMATION





At a Glance: What is Fentanyl?

Here we go with some information.



- Fentanyl is a very powerful synthetic opioid drug with the following characteristics:
- It is 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine
- It is typically used to treat patients with severe pain, especially after surgery, or patients with chronic pain physically tolerant to other opioids
- It is one of the most common drugs involved in drug overdose deaths in the United States (opioids overdose has been alarmingly increasing)
- Fentanyl can be prescribed or illicit
- Prescribed Fentanyl can be given as a shot, a patch that is put on a person's skin, or as lozenges that are sucked like cough drops
- Illicit Fentanyl is sold illegally as a powder, dropped onto blotter

paper, put in eye droppers and nasal sprays, or made into pills that look like other prescription opioids.

Fentanyl's effects include

- extreme happiness
- drowsiness
- nausea
- confusion
- constipation
- sedation
- problems breathing
- unconsciousness

Fentanyl withdrawal symptoms begin as early as a few hours after the drug was last taken and include:

- 1. muscle and bone pain
- 2. sleep problems
- 3. diarrhea and vomiting
- cold flashes with goose bumps
- uncontrollable leg movements
- 6. severe cravings
- Fentanyl overdose can be reversed with Naloxone (Narcan and Kloxxado) as with any other opioid.
- The extreme happiness produced by Fentanyl becomes later an issue with pleasure from other sources.
 The brain adapts to the drug, diminishing its sensitivity, making it hard to feel pleasure from anything besides the drug.
